\$640 million dollars worth of physical built assets

Blue Mountains City Council is the custodian of approximately \$640 million dollars worth of physical built assets. Roads and footpaths meet transport and access needs; building facilities cater for cultural, recreational, health, community and civic purposes; open spaces (parks and reserves) provide recreational opportunities and enhance community life; and underground drains provide for public safety, health and the protection of property. The assets listed below represent the Council's current asset stock. This list is categoried by the Key Directions in *Sustainable Blue Mountains* 2025 with the detail on asset provision drawn from the 2009-2010 Management Plan.

Asset Management Policy

Blue Mountains City Council recognises that infrastructure assets are fundamental to Council's overall service delivery. The Council is committed to managing its physical assets in line with the Council's adopted strategic direction that responds to the community's priorities identified in *Sustainable Blue Mountains 2025*. To achieve this, the City's assets will be managed to ensure they are appropriate for the needs of our community whilst being effectively and sustainably utilised and maintained at an agreed level of serviceable condition, within the financial capacity of the Council.

To implement this policy statement the Council will continually improve the management of its assets through an Asset Management Strategy which is supported by Sustainable Asset Management Plans (see **Asset Management Framework** at www.bmcc.nsw.gov.au/yourcouncil/integratedplanningforservices 2010-2020).

Current Condition of Council's Assets

The Council has completed an assessment of its assets and their condition against the condition ratings in the Table below (these ratings are recommended by the Integrated Planning and Reporting Reform Guidelines issued by the Department of Local Government).

Level	Condition	Description
1	Excellent	No work required (normal maintenance)
2	Good	Only minor maintenance work required
3	Average	Maintenance work required
4	Poor	Renewal required
5	Very Poor	Urgent renewal/upgrading required

In 2010 the Council assessed that most assets are in Average Condition (Level 3) requiring maintenance work with some exceptions as listed below.

The following assets require only minor maintenance and have been assessed as being in **Good Condition (Level 2**):

- SES buildings
- Emergency Centre
- Signage (regulatory and general)
- Waste Management Facilities

The following assets require renewal and have been assessed as being in **Poor Condition (Level 4) with some in Very Poor Condition (Level 5):**

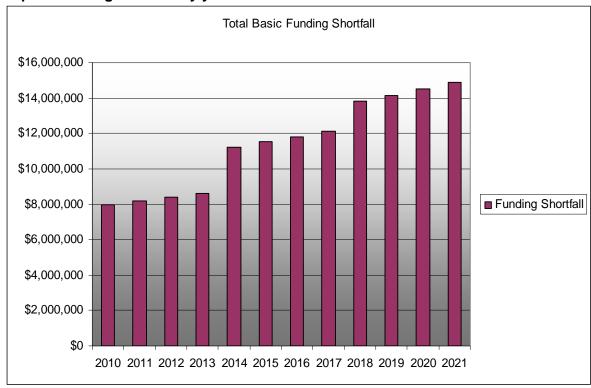
- Fitness and Aquatic Centres Glenbrook Swim Centre, Lawson Swim Centre, Katoomba Outdoor Pool and Blackheath Pool
- Shoulders and Open drainage channels
- Caravan Parks
- Fire trails on Council managed land
- Rural Fire Service Buildings
- Public toilets

Asset Funding Shortfall

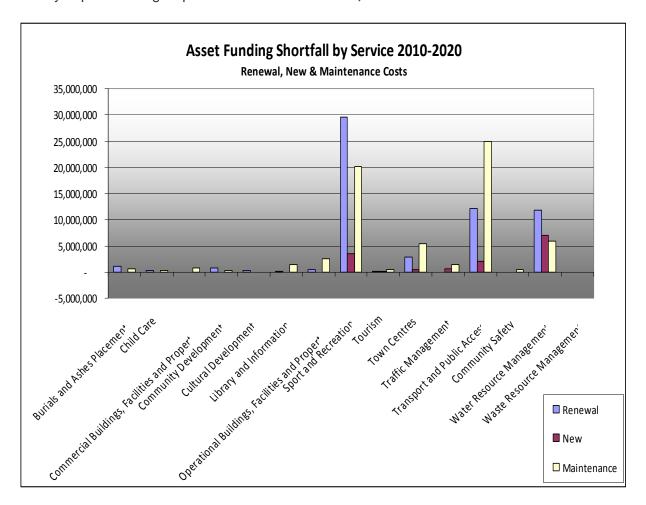
Asset management work has identified a significant funding gap in the renewal, replacement and maintenance of existing Council assets. Assuming the Council retains the current asset stock, the Figure below shows the estimated capital funding shortfall over 2010-2020 by year that will be required to keep all existing assets at Average Condition (Level 3). This does not take into account the impact of cash funding the Major Projects to be completed over 2010-2013.

This shortfall is estimated to be \$116 million for the period 2010-2021

Capital Funding Shortfall by year



The Figure below shows the \$116 million capital funding shortfall by Council service and by capital funding requirement for **maintenance**, **renewal and new assets**.



Four services show total capital funding shortfalls of greater than \$5 million for the period 2010-2020. These services are:-

- 1. Sport and Recreation;
- 2. Water Resource Management
- 3. Transport and Public Access and
- 4. Town Centres

Over half of the capital funding shortfall for renewal is in the Sport and Recreation service. This is due to the ageing of some existing infrastructure which requires replacement to prevent major failures. Over 30% is in Transport and Public Access and Water Resource Management services.

Over 70% of the asset maintenance shortfall is in two services – Sport and Recreation and Transport and Public Access.

Over half of the capital funding shortfall for new assets is in Water Resource management service (stormwater drainage).

The Council faces significant financial challenges in funding future asset renewal, replacement and maintenance requirements.

Asset Planning Objectives for 2010-2020

A sustainable council is one that can meet its funding requirements relative to the provision of its services including the maintenance, renewal and replacement of required assets without imposing excessive debt on current or future generations and without unplanned rate revenue increases.

Towards achieving this, the Draft **Asset Planning Objectives** for 2010-2020 are:

- 1. By 2020, to improve the condition of needed assets to levels in line with community priorities and available funding
- 2. To manage assets in poor condition or at risk with appropriate responses
- 3. To provide needed assets through service planning that is integrated with long term financial planning and workforce planning

Addressing the Asset Funding Shortfall – Impact of a Special Variation to Rates

The extent to which the Council will be able to achieve these objectives over the next 10 years is integrally linked to the funding that will be available for asset renewal, replacement and maintenance.

Given the significant shortfall in funding, an **important choice before residents** is whether or not the existing level of built assets and infrastructure should be maintained, increased or decreased.

If the community supports working towards maintaining and/ or increasing the existing level of built assets and infrastructure then additional funding will be required from a Special Variation to Rates (see Fact Sheet 4 - Proposal for a Special Variation to Rates and Fact Sheet 10 - Impact of Special Variation on Ratepayers) and from ongoing efforts to achieve efficiencies, innovations and revenue.

- The proposed capital works expenditure on assets by Service over 2010-2013 without a special variation

Glossary

Activity	Description
Operations:	The active process of using an asset which will consume resources such as labour, energy and utilities, cleaning, insurance costs, rates, etc. Operations activities keep the asset utilised but have no effect on asset condition, or value.
Maintenance:	Actions for retaining an asset close to its original (or current) condition and fit for its intended purpose. Maintenance can be further defined as:
	Corrective Maintenance (Routine Maintenance) Unplanned maintenance (often referred to as reactive maintenance) that occurs each year as a result of breakdowns, such as sewer chokes, broken locks or windows, vandalism, etc.
	Preventative Maintenance (Routine Maintenance) Regular planned maintenance activities that occur each year such as servicing of air conditioning, pumps and other mechanical services, fire protection, exit lighting, etc. SLA work is scheduled in WRR.
	Condition Based Maintenance (Major Periodic
	Maintenance) Maintenance that occurs outside of a cyclic regime, of a minor nature (i.e. Not classed as renewal) and is based on asset condition assessment. It may include such activities as painting, minor fittings replacement, sections of carpet/floor vinyl replacement, etc
Renewal: (M-Plan – Asset Component Replacement/Refurbishment)	Actions to rebuild or replace major components of an asset to restore it to a required functional condition and extending its current remaining life. Renewal work is the substantial replacement of the asset or a significant asset component to its original size and capacity. Renewal may include air conditioning plant replacement; complete floor finishes replacement, etc.
New Works:	Actions to create new assets or increase the capacity of existing assets beyond their original design capacity/service potential. Capital upgrades or new works may include the construction of a new building, significant alteration and/or additions that ultimately improve the base value of the asset.
Disposal:	Costs associated with the removal or disposal of closed assets. Disposal may also include income derived from the sale of salvageable components of the asset. These may include components ranging from scrap metal to land.
